"We are an Easter People."



2022 felt like a transitional year in the pandemic. In January, we had to limit our gatherings once again due to rises in Covid cases, but thankfully we were able to continue to worship in person. The Thrift Shop also stayed open with continued care to keep volunteers and customers safe. At times it was challenging to keep the shop staffed as volunteers who were ill or tested positive for Covid stayed home. It was disappointing for groups like Pilgrims' Path to have to shift to an online gathering but the disappointment was short lived, as by February we were back to gathering in person.

The Season of Lent began with an in-person Ash Wednesday service and continued with an in-person book study focussing on our well-chosen theme "Good Enough." By Easter things were beginning to feel more "normal" with higher than expected attendance at both Good Friday and Easter services. By the time of our Annual General Meeting, we actually shared a meal together for the first time in two years.

Despite the early set-backs in our emergence from the pandemic, we continued to persevere with our hopes and dreams. At our AGM, we approved funding from the Kerr Bequest for three projects: A Sacred Garden; A Café Ministry and an expanded Mental Health Ministry. In the Spring we contracted with a team of landscape architects to help us envision outdoor spaces on our property that would allow the public to engage their spiritual lives without necessarily coming into the building. They met several times with the Council, representation from the Thrift Shop and our volunteer gardeners listening to our needs and desires and making excellent suggestions. In the end, they came up with a plan that exceeded our expectations. We hope to present it to the congregation for feedback shortly after the AGM. Elsewhere in this report you will find a full account of our new Café ministry as well as an update on the Mental Health Ministry.

In June we said goodbye to our Children and Family Minister, Anne Ellis who headed off to complete a Supervised Ministry Experience in preparation for ordination. We are so proud of Anne and so grateful for the ministry she will now offer to the wider church. In September, we welcomed Ross Shearer as our Children's Ministry Coordinator. Ross has been a gentle and welcoming presence for our children each

Sunday, and he conveniently loves to play Board Games and is therefore a great addition to Family Games Nights!

The Thrift Shop also underwent some changes in personnel this year. After Sandi Smith left in July, Jolene Verdicchio filled in as Assistant Manager over the summer until Rebecca Gabriel and John Andreychuk were hired in the fall. Along with our capable Thrift Shop Manager, Alexis, they continue to support the amazing work of our volunteers and summer students. With so many whose lives have been impacted by the pandemic and the spectre of a recession on the horizon, our Thrift Shop continues to be an important ministry to our community both for those who come to shop and for those who create a sense of belonging and welcome with one another through their volunteering.

The good work we do at Mount Seymour cannot be sustained without the generous financial support of our congregation. The Covid years have placed a significant strain on our resources. In the Fall, the Council organized a Stewardship Campaign in which we invited participants to reflect on the significance of Mount Seymour United in their lives; to increase their givings; go on PAR; and consider a gift to the church in their will. We are immensely grateful for those who responded to this call and encourage those of you who may still be able to respond to do so with generosity.

For too many years to count, Fay Butterfield has quietly kept track of our offerings. At the end of December, Fay resigned from her position due to health concerns. We cannot thank her enough for her faithful service to the church.

In 2022, I continued to serve on the Board of Naramata Centre representing Treena Duncan, Executive Minister of Pacific Mountain Region. This year we hired a new Executive Director and began work on a Strategic Plan to sustain the Centre into the future. I also served on the Fundraising Cabinet for the First Forward Campaign to redevelop First United Church. My continuing education time was spent completing a two year certificate program in Spiritual Direction with the Haden Institute. I graduated from the program in May and was honoured to be invited to join the leadership team offering silent retreats at Rivendell Retreat Centre on Bowen Island. As this is a learning curve for me, I will continue to use my continuing education time for this ministry.

In September, I was completely caught off guard by the surprise birthday party thrown for me during our welcome back lunch. It was such a beautiful reflection of the heart of our community that I am so blessed to serve. Those of you who give of your time, talents and presence for the life and work of our church are such an affirmation of our Easter faith. We have endured many hardships these last several years but with faith, perseverance and the love and power of God, we continue to live and proclaim the good news to one another and the world around us.

Thank you to our wise and thoughtful Council, to Mary Sparks, Kathryn Ferriss, Kelly Nobles, Kirsten Harkins, Ward Branch, Younes Skhissi and Lorna Leckie who meet each month to make faithful decisions on our behalf for the direction of the church. Thank you to Catherine Branch and the Ministry and Personnel Committee and to Steve Wellenbrink and the Property Team for their tending of our human and physical resources. Thank you to the Thrift Shop Leadership Team, the Strategic Planning Team and to each and every one who has served our ministry in a myriad of ways.

Our core staff team of Carla, Alexis, Jenn and Julian are to be commended for their tireless efforts on our behalf. Cheryl, Ross, Dani, Marcus, Dominique, Rebecca, John and Sabrina are highly committed part time staff members who do a tremendous job reflecting our core values, getting things done and animating our communal life.

Together, we are a testament to the goodness of life and the ability we have within us to find a way through times of joy and challenge. Thanks Be.

ASSOCIATE MINISTER | REV. CARLA WILKS



The Dalai Lama said "Open your arms to change, but don't let go of your values." We have been through a lot of change over the last few years, but we have always been able to hold on to what is important to us and find meaningful ways to move forward through the difficult times of restricted gathering.

Thankfully 2022 gave us a lot more flexibility. I'm so grateful for the openness and commitment of so many people who have worked together to make Mount Seymour what it is today, despite the many challenges and changes.

I appreciated the small group who joined me in the first half of the year on Wednesday mornings for a reading and some prayer time at Sacred Pause.

Monthly meditation evenings continued and in 2022 I led them simultaneously in person and via Zoom. This allowed those who live far outside the area, plus those who prefer the comfort of their own space, to continue to participate while also allowing in-person meditation in the sanctuary. Other opportunities for reflection and growth together were the Lent and Advent book studies, which always left me feeling inspired by the group conversations that took place.

Our commitment to seeking opportunities for reconciliation continued with our Indigenous Book Study. In the first half of the year we met on Zoom, reading two books together. We decided to do something different in the fall, and we read two additional books and had discussions after church on Sundays. It was great to have people who hadn't participated before join our studies in the fall. The more that we can learn about the truth of Indigenous experiences in Canada, the better equipped we will be to engage in helpful dialogue when we are faced with misinformation and unjust stereotypes.

In our community outreach ministry, we continue to support First United Church through our Thrift Shop sales and goods, and also through our participation in the Coldest Night of the Year walk in 2022. I know that our contributions to First United make a significant difference in the lives of people living in the Downtown Eastside of Vancouver. I also had the privilege of getting to know and supporting a Palestinian refugee in her plight to get her immigration application processed and her family reunited. I am so thankful for this community for your willingness to help when presented with opportunities to make a difference.

Our mental health ministry team worked throughout the year to get our plan and proposal together, and we look forward to it being launched in 2023.

I enjoy being involved in all aspects of the Thrift Shop, from sharing the values of the church at the new volunteer orientation interviews, interviewing summer students, and getting to know the volunteers during their shift. I love hearing the stories of customers in the Shop and supporting the Thrift Shop staff when and where I can. I enjoy participating on the Leadership team and feel privileged that I get to lead the Strategic planning team. I'm so grateful to all our volunteers for the many hours that they give to the Shop to make it such a success. The connections and support that I have witnessed between the volunteers continues to inspire me, and as part of the leadership team, we continue to find ways to nurture those relationships and that kind of community.

The Strategic Planning Team for the Thrift Shop was rebooted in 2022, with a task to take a look at the strategic plan that was completed in 2020 and implement the plan in ways that will be helpful to the long term stability of the Shop. Also more generally, as a team we look at the Shop from a big picture perspective rather than from a day to day operational perspective.

In my wider church work with the Pacific Mountain Region, I continue to serve on the Lay Leadership Support Committee, and one of the exciting projects that I have been involved with is the online learning modules that we created for the training of Ministry and Personnel Committees throughout the Region. I also had the privilege of being chaplain at the Candidacy Board interviews for United Church students who are at different stages of their ministry exploration/education and training.

As ministers there is an expectation that we will participate in continuing education each year to expand and strengthen our skills. In 2022 I participated in a Dementia Learning Summit which added to the dementia focused learning that I did a few years ago. I also took the Ministry of Supervision course in the fall, which is a required course for accreditation as an educational supervisor for a ministry student. That was a really helpful course, and I have continued to meet regularly with the triad I practiced with during the course, for ongoing practice. In October I attended the Total Clergy Wellbeing event at Naramata Centre. The event was inspiring and renewing and gave me some much needed time for reflection. I had not been to Naramata since I went as a teenager in the early 1990s, so it was really good to be back there. The most valuable thing for me at that event was the opportunity to connect in person with colleagues again. It was a wonderful time of sharing and reflecting together on the challenges and joys of ministry.

Mount Seymour United Church is special, and as many of you know, one of my favourite pastimes is telling people just how special we are. It is even better when we get to hear how special we are from

others. I recently had a great opportunity to do that when I was invited to the office of our MP, Terry Beech, because we received the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Award in November. We received this honour because of our hard work and community dedication as well as for exemplifying the spirit of the Queen's Jubilee, which included providing a safe and welcome space for LGBTQ2S+ folks, and the great work that the Thrift Shop does to support the community through low-cost goods, recycling, and



opportunities for volunteerism, and creating community. Mr. Beech also talked about the work that we do to support refugees, and the support of youth through the summer job program. He also noted that we serve the community when we open our building for use by all candidates' meetings and concerts. I took the opportunity to tell him about our support of First United in the Downtown Eastside and the Giving Tree that we have during Advent. I was so proud to represent you and accept the award for all that we do as a congregation in the community.

These were some of the highlights for me of 2022. I don't know what 2023 will bring, but whatever happens, I know we will open our arms to the challenges and opportunities but hang on tight to our values. It is such a privilege to be in ministry with you here at Mount Seymour. I am so grateful for the ways that you share your gifts and your lives and your faith journeys. What an honour to witness such faithfulness at work. It is such a blessing to work with a supportive, resilient, and caring ministry team, staff, Council, and group of volunteers. I pray that God will guide us through this next year toward even more meaningful ministry in our community and beyond.

WORSHIP AND CHRISTIAN DEVELOPMENT

After a last minute change in our plans for in-person worship on Christmas Eve, 2021 due to health restrictions, we started 2022 off with what felt like a daring decision. With an abundance of caution, rather than staying closed on Sundays and returning to having only worship online like most of our neighbouring United Churches, we decided to keep our doors open. It was a good way to satisfy those who wanted to continue worshipping in person while serving those who chose to stay safe at home by posting the weekly recording.

We started the year with our tradition of distributing star gift words on Epiphany Sunday. Inspired by both in person and recorded testimonials about how individual star gifts had guided people (or not!) in the previous year, we are always grateful for those who come forward to share what their word has meant to them. For the rest of the season of Epiphany, we were carried by the theme "Let Your Light Shine" as we explored different spiritual practices that help



us to keep our faith during difficult times. A highlight of this season was having our Children and Family Minister, Anne Ellis, preach. We were so happy to be able to have the Gospel Choir back in our midst to celebrate Black History month in February as the pandemic began to slowly wane once again.



Lent began with an in-person Ash Wednesday service for the first time in two years. Our theme for the season "Good Enough" based on the book of the same name by author Kate Bowler really struck a chord. During a time when our world has felt so off balance, reflecting on how blessed we are, regardless of how imperfect our lives and world might be, hit home. Many people chose to read Kate's book as part of their Lenten discipline and Rev. Carla and Rev. Nancy hosted both online and inperson gatherings for further discussion.

After a rousing Easter service featuring Marcus Mosely and the Gospel Choir, we settled into several weeks of reflecting on "Life after Death: Living as an Easter People." One of our Thrift Shop Volunteers, Chris Lovelidge, captured our imaginations when he came one Sunday to talk about his near death experience. To enhance this series, we hosted two evenings to "talk about death." The first focussed on having a "good death" and was led by Rev. Wade Lifton. The second was a Death Café in which people ended up sharing about their thoughts and experiences with Medical Assistance in Dying.

In the Spring, Anne Ellis ran a group for youth seeking to reaffirm their baptismal faith and Rev. Nancy hosted an adult seekers group for people wanting to become full members of the church. On Pentecost Sunday, four youth and three adults made professions of faith at a wonderful all-ages service. This bittersweet celebration was also Anne's last Sunday with us before she left to complete a Supervised Ministry Experience in Summerland in preparation for Ordination. We are so grateful for Anne's faithful years of service with us and the many lives she touched during her tenure.

During the summer season of "Ordinary Time" Nancy and Carla preached lectionary based sermons and the pattern of our services followed a simpler format. As summer drew to a close, we booked Cates Park for our annual Labour Day Sunday outdoor worship service but for the second year in a row we ended up inside due to rain. It was still a great day to launch our fall theme "Living with Respect in Creation" in which we looked at the ways we could reduce, reuse, recycle, repent, reclaim and rejoice to honour our relationship with creation. A high point of this series was Thanksgiving Sunday when we had our first allages service with spiritual practice stations since February 2020.

Our next series, "Reshaped: What We're Made For" was probably our most popular of 2022. Learning about change theory while reflecting on changes in our personal lives and in the church was relevant for many. The fact that each Sunday we were invited to create something with PlayDoh made each week a new adventure.

Plays

We followed this series with two weeks of Stewardship focusing on Living Generously. One week we concentrated on why people are generous with their givings to our congregation and the next week we highlighted the ways we are generous towards the community around us. We also celebrated those who have made bequests to the church through their wills.

Our Advent Theme "Reflecting the Sacred" was based on the teachings of Father Richard Rohr. The companion book study helped us stay grounded in the places we see the sacred reflected around us in the world and in one another. Despite record snowfalls, we had a fantastic turnout from the Gospel Choir on Advent Four. When Christmas Eve arrived in the midst of travel disruptions, leaks and floods due to melting snow, we were so grateful to be able to open our doors and welcome the public back for two services for the first time in three years. Hearing the joyous sounds of the many children who came for the 4pm service and standing together to sing Joy to the World at the 7pm service lifted our spirits and reminded us why there really is nothing like gathering in person for worship. The live pageants at both services were made up of every child and youth currently connected to the church. It was so good to be able to celebrate in person!

Music Ministry

With in-person worship back in session this year we were so grateful to have our amazing music ministry team of Julian Pattison, Marcus Mosely and Dominique Hogan in place on Sunday mornings. They do an excellent job at choosing and creating music to amplify our worship experience. Marcus and Dominique were joined regularly by Dan Morrison on drums and the days when Mary Sparks showed up with her flute were always appreciated. Marc and Michelle Coulombe shared their musical talent with us both for our Cates Park service and then again on Christmas Eve. Tierney Ness and Catherine Branch loaned us their voices on Christmas Eve, making our worship truly special. We are so grateful for all who share their musical gifts with us.

During the summer months we give our musicians a break. This year Sean Bayntun and Arielle Balance covered most weeks.

Audio Visual

Owen Hoover has done a great job running the power point and sound system on Sunday mornings, for Memorial Services and special events. We were sad to say goodbye to him in December when he moved to Summerland but grateful that Dani Durland was willing to take over the position. Sheida Canary has also been trained on the system and she has filled in for both Owen and Dani on occasion. Angela Wilks has been editing our services from Waterloo, Ontario, where she attends university. This allows people not able to be with us in person to watch the service online after it has been posted.

Adult Faith Formation

The Meditation Group, led by Rev. Carla, continued to meet via zoom once a month and most months in person as well.

Pilgrims' Path, led by Rev. Nancy, met monthly to worship, share a meal and engage in Spiritual Practices. Their January retreat was cancelled due to Covid but the May and September retreats went ahead. In September we had an intake of new members and the format was somewhat changed. We no longer share a meal before we meet and groups of three and four meet once a month in between sessions to share experiences. There were over 22 participants enrolled in Pilgrims' Path this year.

Healing Yoga was offered on Monday evenings throughout the fall by Kirsten Harkins. Donations for the United Church Healing Fund in support of Residential School Survivors are collected each week. Thank you to Kirsten for offering this ministry which reaches out to the community and supports a worthy cause.

In both the Spring and Fall, Rev. Carla led Indigenous Book Studies to explore issues related to Indigenous people in Canada. In the Winter and Spring they met online and read "They Called me Number One: Secrets and Survival at an Indian Residential School" by Bev. Sellars and "Five Little Indians" by Michelle Good. In the fall they met in person following Sunday worship reading "My Conversations with Canadians" by Lee Maracle and "Highway of Tears: A True Story of Racism, Indifference and the Pursuit of Justice for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls" by Jessica McDiarmid.

Online and in-person book discussion groups were offered during the seasons of Advent and Lent. During Lent we read "Good Enough" by Kate Bowler and Jessica Richie and for Advent we read "Every Thing is Sacred" by Richard Rohr and Patrick Boland.

A Seekers Group was offered in May to those wishing to become full members of the church.

Our weekly worship services and faith formation programs are planned and executed by a small but dedicated team made up of staff and most importantly, volunteers. Carol Pettigrew continues to enhance our worship experiences through beautiful visual displays based on each season's themes. Kathryn Ferriss makes sure we have bread to share and cups to bless for communion each month. To each of you who has said "yes" to reading scripture, sharing a story about your life of faith, serving communion or lighting the Advent wreath, we say thank you for enriching our worshipping life. To the greeters who do such a wonderful job of welcoming us each Sunday and then grabbing people to help take up the offering we offer our heartfelt appreciation. Thanks also to our "alumni" who returned home at Christmas and so willingly stepped into the roles of greeting, lighting candles and taking up the offering.

MISSION AND OUTREACH

We were involved in some advocacy and support for a local Palestinian refugee who has experienced many setbacks and delays in the process of her immigration and has also been trying to bring her husband, a journalist in danger in Gaza, to Canada to be with her and their sons. We coordinated a meeting between her and our MP, and we also gave her a financial gift from our refugee fund to help with the fees associated with her application.

Our Thrift Shop continues to be a significant place where outreach to the community happens. We provide goods in need to a number of organizations. On several occasions in 2022 we provided goods for families in need who had experienced devastation in some way (lost everything in a fire, new to this country and neighbourhood as refugees, lost income, etc.) or were otherwise in need.

In September we had a table at Parkgate Days. We had some great opportunities to share about Mount Seymour United's programs and activities to members of the community, and hear about Mount Seymour's impact and community focused reputation from members of the wider community.

In 2022 for the second year, we participated in the Blueridge Cares
Christmas hamper program. We provided
Thrift Shop gift certificates to all of the individuals who were supported by the hamper program.



Our Giving Tree was a success again in 2022, with many items collected for both Hollyburn Family Services (North Shore Youth Safe House) and First United Church.



Thank you for remaining committed to the ways that we reach out to the community beyond our walls and help to make a difference in people's lives.

Mental Health Ministry


Mount Seymour United Church is committed to supporting the mental health of our community.

In that respect, we have identified a gap in the availability of counselling for those suffering from mental health challenges, particularly given the limitations on the extent to which counselling is covered by public or private insurance plans.

To assist in remedying this problem, Mount Seymour United Church has created a pilot project with a commitment of \$35,000 to fund various initiatives over the next year, including financial assistance to support individuals who are seeking therapy. A team has been working throughout 2022 to get this project up and running. We hope to launch it in 2023. There is more information and an application on the church website.

Perogies, cabbage rolls and polish sausage were made and served as a fundraiser to assist those fleeing the war in Ukraine. \$1000 was raised. This event dovetailed beautifully with our farewell celebrations for Anne Ellis.

Peter and Ellen hosted well attended lunches in September and October as well as the annual Turkey Lunch fundraiser in November. Being able to gather at table with good food, company and conversation really helped us to regain a sense of being community once again. Thank you Ellen, Peter and all who volunteered to help out.

Men's and Women's Breakfast

Both groups have seen growth during 2022 welcoming new members into their fold. The women meet in the Café space on Saturday mornings for coffee and the men meet on Thursdays and purchase their breakfast from the Café. Men's and Women's Breakfast are the longest standing groups at the church. The mutual support and belonging they offer one another is a vital part of our ministry.

Caring Connections Team

The team, made up of Ruth Townsend, Sherrill McLeary, Jen-Beth Fulton, Judy Frey, Mardi Joughin, Carla Wilks and Nancy Talbot, meet once a month. In between meetings they pray for, phone, visit, deliver prayer shawls and send cards to people in need. They offer hospitality for our Blue Christmas service and deliver poinsettias to those who live in care homes or those who have had a challenging year. Carla also oversees Meal Trains as needed.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

Judy Frey took over leadership of this ministry from Sylvia Zandberg this year. She ensures that there is wool available for knitters and organizes the shawls that have been made. Thank you to Judy and to everyone who has donated wool, knit and delivered shawls to those in need of care.

Cheryl Shott continues to be a great support with my financial administrative tasks. Donna Pawluk has been a valued asset in counting, depositing funds and also became another signing officer which is a great help in ensuring cheques can be issued in a timely manner. Fay Butterfield has been wonderful to work with and to her great credit has kept all our tax records straight throughout the years. Steve Wellenbrink has become a great asset and resource in helping manage building maintenance and problem solving. I really appreciate all of their help.

One of the biggest changes and exciting challenges this year has been the launch of the Café project. We started planning in early spring, spent the entire summer working through renovation plans, repairing espresso/coffee equipment, re-organizing the kitchen and working with volunteers to re-imagine the look and feel of the café space. Logan Grotta, student from the Thrift Shop summer program, was incredibly helpful in assisting with cleaning, re-organizing, painting and staffing the Café once we opened.

As we have learned and grown, we welcomed Cristina Arnold into our Café who was able to help move us even closer to where we are today. I am very grateful for all their help and the support we have received from everyone at the Church.

THRIFT SHOP | ALEXIS DOSS



2022 was another remarkable year for the Thrift Shop – here are a few statistics:

We raised \$37,238.70 for First United.

Our sales Thrift Shop sales for 2022 was \$248,258.00.

We made \$5726 from craigslist and Sport Swap sales in 2022 for combined total of \$253,984.

Our social media presence has grown steadily. We now have 414 followers on Instagram, 663 followers on Facebook.

We hired two assistant managers (John Andreychuk and Rebecca Gabriel) to join our team.

Our customer demographic increased as well in both age and gender. The numbers of customers are now reaching that of pre-covid.

The shop is now open three days a week (Thursdays 11-6pm, Fridays 11-4pm, and Saturday 11-4pm). This has been well received by customers and has allowed us to move more products and reach more customers.

We added 15 new volunteers to our roster, for a total of 115 active volunteers – some of which take a leave or are not able to be active on a regular basis.

Our donations have continued to increase. We continue to have pickups from Diabetes Canada, Big Brothers and Salvation Army which take everything we cannot sell three times a week.

We continue to recycle Items we can not sell or use. Our volunteers graciously offered to drop off books, clothing, metal, stationary, toys and electronic recycling to various recycling stations.

Last summer we had 8 paid student employees funded by a grant from the Federal Government.



By any measurement, we are a growing and thriving social enterprise operation that serves our neighborhood and community. We give 15% of our revenue to First United Church, but we also give inkind clothing and other items they tell us they need.

Looking Glass Project on North Shore (yarn to support those suffering from bulimia, anorexia and other eating disorders)

North Shore Youth Safe House

First United Church

Donated towels to Wildlife rescue B.C.

Donated cutlery to Windsor Secondary School recycling initiative

While we do not ask prospective volunteers about their spiritual beliefs, we do reflect the values of Mount Seymour United Church, and we are clear with prospective volunteers that we are part of the church community.

We are looking into a permanent second donation shed in lieu of the rented shipping container we have now and continue to look for new ways to outsource items we can't use or don't accept.

I want to close by telling you that my work with MSUC Thrift Shop has given me many contacts and friends that I would not have made otherwise – so am very appreciative of this opportunity – and to get to know so many special people on many levels.

It has also shown me how caring our volunteers are —they take on responsibilities of working with others who may be suffering in many ways; they network with other agencies in the community and make our shop a compassionate and caring environment.

Rev. Carla and I would like to express our gratitude for the Leadership Team of the Thrift Shop, who meet monthly to work to discuss and problem solve to keep the shop running smoothly on a daily basis. The Leadership team consists of Alexis Doss, Rev. Carla Wilks, Judy White, Norma Austin, Jill Greengrass, Toni Rivera, Irene Huva, Ginny Lovelidge, Maya Regehr, Mavis Simmons, Eileen Wegwitz and Gail Whitney.

The Thrift Shop Strategic Planning team was rebooted in 2022, with an eye on the longer-term goals of the shop and on helping to problem solve the issues inhibiting the shop's growth, some of which were identified in the strategic plan that was completed in 2020. Many thanks to this team for their time and energy and commitment to the shop's success. The team includes Rev. Carla Wilks, Roger Brain, Kim Branch, Judy White, Gail Whitney and Dale Kobewka.

I can't close without giving special acknowledgement to our faithful and long-standing volunteer — Bud Taggart — who we need to acknowledge with a big VOTE OF THANKS — Let's give him a BIG ROUND OF APPLAUSE...

I would also like to thank Chris Loveridge for all the shelving, hanging and fixing he has done for the shop in the past few years.

THE CAFÉ PROJECT

One of the most exciting developments at the church this year has been the creation of a Café. The Café is open three days a week from $11-3 \,\mathrm{pm}$ serving delicious food and drinks at a reasonable price.

The Café Project was initially conceived by a team of Lori Keith, Lisa Banks, Nancy Talbot and our office administrator, Jenn Farrell as a way to create opportunities for vocational development for people with social economic barriers while providing a place of welcome and belonging for Thrift Shop customers and neighbours. Funding for the start up came from three sources: The Kerr Bequest; A Pacific Mountain Region Pro-Vision Grant; and a private donation.



Jenn, who has extensive experience in the hospitality industry, was hired to oversee the development of the project. Over the course of the summer she worked with contractors to renovate the kitchen and with Thrift Shop volunteers who decorated the café space. Our first barista was hired in September and by October we opened our doors to the public. As word of mouth spread through the community throughout the fall, more and more customers started showing up. Volunteers stepped in to help with hosting and clean up.

On the Thursday before Christmas, one of the last days the café was open in 2022, Ruth Townsend and her Parkgate Singers hosted a Christmas Carol Sing-along. It was a great way to introduce the café to a wider audience.

The Café is a pilot project we will continue to nurture into 2023. A Partnership with The North Shore Foundry is underway and in the Spring we will apply for a grant from the National Church's Seeds of Hope program. Stop by for lunch or coffee and a scone. Bring your friends!

Thrift Shop

Alexis Doss, our fearless Thrift Shop Manager, has kept the Shop running like clockwork and taken on new ways of reaching out to the community. For example, we are lucky to hire eight summer students through a Federal government employment grant. Alexis has taken this program for students and expanded it beyond just work experience. She has programming for the students to make it a more enriching experience.

In July, Sandi Smith, the Assistant Manager decided to leave us. We have been very lucky to have Rebecca Gabriel and John Andreychuk join us. Between them, they share Sandi's hours and give us twice the flexibility to cover holidays and other absences. They also give us twice the ideas and initiative and we are thrilled to have them.

Administration

Jenn Farrell has been working away, both in her office and out! She continues in her main role as our office administrator, creating PowerPoints for Sunday, putting together the e-news weekly, upkeeping the website and then taking care of all of the other office items and financial paperwork that come across her desk. Outside of the office, she has taken on a contract to get our new Café up and running! She has used her skills in food management to help get the kitchen ready, staff in place and everything started. She even does the baking!!

PROPERTY | STEVE WELLENBRINK

2022 was a year where we welcomed people back into the church. The renewed property team met several times in 2022. We made progress on some issues and are working on several priorities in 2023.

The kitchen renovation to accommodate the café was completed in 2022. The result has been well received. The upgraded configuration serves the café well. It also seems to work well for rental users and for Sunday morning food and beverage service. One concern that we have is the 30 year old dishwasher, and that it is getting near the end of it's service life. We are putting together a contingency plan/budget for its eventual replacement.

We had to find a new snow plowing and salting contractor, as The Parkway Crew discontinued offering those services. We got off to a bit of a rough start with the new contractor, but eventually they got the message that we are not a one day a week kind of operation.

Thank you to all the gardening team volunteers for keeping our gardens looking so good. Last Fall we contracted with Holland Landscapers Ltd. to do an end of the season clean-up. Starting March 2023, we have hired Holland Landscapers to do garden maintenance every two weeks. This is in support of our volunteer gardeners. Holland will mow and edge the lawns, weed beds, trim and prune as needed. They will be on site every second Friday at about 11:00.

There was a leak into Nancy and Jenn's offices on Christmas Eve. The leaks occurred during snow melting and warming temperatures. We contacted our insurance carrier, who dispatched an adjuster and a contractor to look at the situation. The damage is minimal, and doesn't warrant a claim. Burrard Roofing investigated the possibility of a roof leak. At this point there is no definitive reason for the leak. In the meantime we will have to open up the wall to check for toxic mould.

We are hoping to organize another Spring cleaning Saturday this year. Our Spring cleaning day was well supported and yielded great results. Believe it or not, it was also a fun way to be together and get to know people a little better. Thanks to everyone who came out to help.

The motorized door at the thrift shop entrance was repaired this year, however, there are still ongoing problems with its operation. I sure hope that I'm not writing about the thrift shop door again next year.

In 2022 we started investigating the upgrading of our sanctuary sound system. We are currently evaluating proposals from two audio/visual firms which specialize in audio/visual systems for churches. We intend to get input from key users (Deep Cove Coffee House, for example) in making a decision. A modern system, with a digital mixer will make things easier for existing users (as they will just have to push a button to get back to their settings after a different user has changed things). It could also prove

to be a selling point in attracting new rental groups who require a better sound system than what we currently have. The good news is that our projector that broke down recently can be repaired for a few hundred dollars, rather than the ten to twenty thousand for a replacement. Good news.

TREASURER'S REPORT | WARD BRANCH

The lingering effects of COVID 19 continued to affect our financial situation in 2022. This Annual Report contains the 2022 financial results and delivers our 2023 budget.

2022 Income Statement and Balance Sheet

We have essentially made it about half way back from the depths of COVID. Givings were up, as was revenue from the Thrift Shop. Indeed, regular givings were as high as they have been in a decade, and the Thrift Shop activity was nearly back to pre-pandemic levels. On the other hand, rental income remains down, largely because we have taken space out of commission for the Thrift Shop expansion, but also because demand for in person meetings has not returned to pre-pandemic levels. Furthermore, our expenses are up, as we have hired additional staff to support new initiatives such as the Thrift Shop expansion and our new café. Another negative element was the fact that there were no more COVID government supports in 2022 to offset our wage costs.

Thankfully, we continue to have capital available to sustain us while we continue to expand our services and outreach. Hopefully the increased revenue we expected to earn from our various new projects and initiatives before COVID will finally reach the levels we were hoping for in 2019.

If there is good news, it is that we expected our funds to have to fall by about \$218,000 last year, but they only fell about \$197,000. So we can at least say that we did better than expected!

Thank you to Meg Clarke for her help organizing our Living Generously stewardship campaign this fall and to everyone who responded by increasing their givings, going on PAR or adding a bequest to their will. Your commitment is making a difference.

2023 Annual Budget

This will be another tough year, unless we see some positive surprises in terms of givings, Thrift Shop revenue or rentals. Furthermore, we will need to pay back \$40,000 of one of the government's COVID loans by the end of the year (silver lining: \$20,000 of this \$60,000 loan will be forgiven). We are projecting that we will need to use a further \$191,000 from our funds this year. On the positive front, this drawdown embeds plans for continued work on special projects such as the Sacred Garden, a Mental Health Ministry, the new Café, and continued support for the Thrift Shop. If all goes well, we are hopeful that we will "turn the corner" in 2023. This budgeted fund drawdown should still leave our reserve funds at more than \$900,000, so we aren't in imminent danger. But we clearly cannot continue on this same

path long term. Either revenue will have to go up (more fun!) or expenses will need to go down (less fun) long term.

Our bookkeeper, Cheryl Shott, is to be commended for her continued good work keeping our financial house in order. She is assisted by our office administrator, Jenn Farrell, who writes cheques, handles our banking and oversees our capable counters, Verna Wilson, Doreen Habbkirk, Gladys Johnston and Marlene Plezia. Donna Pawluk continues to complete our weekly deposits. We thank them for them all for their service.

Our Envelope Secretary, Fay Butterfield, has kept track of our offerings and issued annual tax receipts for several years. We appreciate her dedication to this work and wish her well as she steps down from this position.

7. Minister's Report: Rev. Nancy Talbot provided a summary of 2021 activities, highlighting her sabbatical, the return to in-person activities in the Fall of 2021, and gratitude to Council and staff for their continued adaptability.

For 2022, projects include opening a café space (Lori Keith leading this initiative), focusing on the outdoor space and potential for a sacred garden, a mental health ministry (led by Ward Branch). These projects will be funded from the bequest. Suggestions from the congregation for projects are welcomed.

Anne Ellis is continuing her ministry training at the Atlantic School of Theology and will be completing her Supervised Ministry Experience with another congregation.

The floor was opened to questions. No questions posed.

- 8. Thrift Shop Report: Rev. Carla Wilks provided an overview of Thrift Shop activities in 2021, which has continued to grow. Currently, there are over 100 volunteers, including 17 new volunteers joining this year. The new sorting space was opened in the summer. The Treasure Cove was opened as a dedicated space for jewelry sales. Shop days were extended to three (Thursday, Friday and Saturday). Eight summer students were hired through the federal Canada Summer Jobs program. Senior volunteers were able to return to work on shop days in the fall, and tea time has started again. The floor was opened to questions. No questions posed.
- 9. Team Reports: Steve Wellenbrink provided a property report. Special recognition to James Fulton and Glady Johnson for their stewardship of the building and gardens. Additional volunteers would be welcome, due to these recent retirements. The floor was opened to questions. No questions posed.

10. Treasurer's Report 2021 Financial Statements and 2022 Budget (W. Branch):

W. Branch presented the Financial Statements for 2021.

From the Balance Sheet (Appendix 2) and Preliminary Income Statement (Appendix 3, including budget), it was noted that:

- The endowment fund was held at its opening balance.
- Government programs were accessed, such as the wage subsidy, which were extended during 2021 but have now ended. The Canada Emergency Business Assistance Load is an interest free loan until December 31, 2023, with \$20,000 forgiven if repaid by that date.
- Major donators have recently passed, which is impacting the givings.
- The Thrift Shop contribution to First United was \$31,258 a significant increase from 2020.
- The increase in the National UCC Assessment is a reflection of the financial health of MSUC.
- The Thrift Shop contribution to First United was \$31,258 a significant increase from 2020.

- The operating deficit was \$48,926, which was better than expected, in large part due to the government programs accessed.
- Proposed growth initiatives are budgeted for 2022:

Mental Health Ministry: \$35,000

Café Space 2022 Expenses: \$25,000

Sacred Garden 2022 Expenses: \$25,000

First United Building Contribution: \$10,000

• The proposed 2022 budget will result in a deficit of \$291,197, which will be covered by the endowment fund, bringing the balance of the fund to \$1 million.

The floor was opened to questions.

A question from the floor was a clarification the amortization line item of \$73,362 is an accounting item, and does not represent cash loss (Mike Hetherington).

A question from the floor sought clarification on Thrift Shop impacts (Jim Crook). Improvements to the shop were expensed at \$14,636 in 2021 and budgeted at \$10,000 in 2022. The revenue for 2022 is forecasted at \$235,000, significantly more than in 2020 (\$134,221) and an increase from 2021 (\$213,171). The contribution to First United will continue to increase proportionately.

Motion that the Financial Statements for 2021 as set out in the Annual Report be approved, subject to financial review by Cahill Chartered Accountants. M/S (Kirsten Harkins /Frank Luba) **Carried unanimously.**

Motion that the budget for 2022 as set out in the Annual Report be approved. M/S (Frank Luba /Faye Butterfield) **Carried unanimously.**

- 11. Motion to adopt 2021 Annual Report. Acting Chair Catherine Branch expressed appreciation to staff for its preparation. M/S (Jim Crook /James Fultom) Carried unanimously.
